### QUICK HITTERS

Jacksonville saw it's six game winning streak snapped in the second half of a double header on Saturday at NJIT.

JU is in the midst of its longest road stretch of the season, playing eight games away from John Sessions Stadium. The Dolphins are currently 3-1 at the halfway mark of the trip.

The team is off to its best conference start since 2008, when JU won six straight to open up ASUN play.

Jacksonville is currently tied for first in the ASUN Conference standings with Liberty. The two teams meet in Jacksonville to close out the month of April.

Florida State currently owns a six game winning streak over Jacksonville. Head Coach Chris Hayes has not won a game vs. the Seminoles since moving up from Associate Head Coach to Head Coach in the 2017 season.

The two teams were scheduled to meet early this year in Jacksonville, which would have been Mike Martin's 38th and final trip to John Sessions Stadium, but rain forced two postponements.

The last time Jacksonville beat Florida State, it was to close out a season sweep of the Noles in 2016. JU won 6-2 to May 10 in Jacksonville, after winning 7-3 on March 1 in Tallahassee.

The last time JU faced off against Florida State when the Noles were unranked resulted in a 20-2 loss at Dick Howser Stadium on May 9, 2017.

Tonight's starter pitcher, sophomore RHP Austin Temple, is making his third appearance and second career start against the Seminoles. He started the last matchup between the two teams, going 2.0 innings, allowing two hits and two earned runs, while striking out one and walking two on May 9, 2018. He also appeared in relief last year in Jacksonville, striking out three while allowing one hit and one run in an inning of action.

Temple has 10 strikeouts in his last eight innings, including a season-high six in a start at FAMU last Tuesday. He had only five all season in 7.2 innings prior to this past week's two appearances.

The Dolphins wrap the road trip this weekend, but do get to sleep in their own beds. JU looks for a third straight conference series win across town against rival North Florida. JU has not lost a series to the Ospreys since 2015 and won three of the six total meetings between the two schools last year, winning two of three at home, while dropping the midweek "Mayor's Cup" game and splitting the meetings in the ASUN Championship at Harmon Stadium last May.

**HEFFRON HITTING**

Jacksonville's left fielder, in his first year with the program, is starting to find his rhythm at the plate. Over the last 10 games, in which the Dolphins are 7-3, the junior is hitting a team-best .387, including a career-best four hit day in which he reached base five times at FAMU last Tuesday. He has also proved to be a threat on the base paths, swiping four bags in that same time frame.

**SPEED KILLS**

JU has already stolen the most bases of the Chris Hayes era, with 37 already this season, after swiping only 36 all of last year. Fourteen of those steals have come in the last 10 games. Cory Heffron leads the team with eight stolen bases. Last year's season leader Chris Lehane swiped 11 in 14 tries.

**WELCOME BACK**

When redshirt-junior SS Dakota Julylia, a regular starter since game one of his freshman season, sat out all of last year with an injury, all he could think about was how much he missed the game. "I'll never take this game for granted again," he said following an early season victory this year. Since coming back to start all 28 games so far this season for the Dolphins, he is on pace to shatter any prior career marks. He is tied for second on the team with 17 RBI (career-high is 20) and has already topped his career-best in steals with four. He had 10 extra base hits his sophomore season, and already has eight this year, including his first career home run.

**ROAD WARRIORS**

After struggling initially on the road this season, the Dolphins are starting to find greater success away from John Sessions Stadium. JU has won three of its last four on the road, and are currently in the midst of an eight game road trip.

**EXTRA, EXTRA!**

Jacksonville has already played in two extra inning games, going 1-1. Both games have taken place in the midweek. The Dolphins went to extras three times all of last season, going 2-1 in such affairs.

**CLEAN SWEEPS**

JU picked up its third weekend sweep this season, taking all three games at home against Lipscomb. The Dolphins completed six weekend sweeps last year, with exactly three occurring at home and three on the road.

**HOME SWEET HOME**

Since the tough opening weekend against Indiana State (who is now 21-4 on the year), JU has lost just one game in the friendly confines of John Sessions Stadium, an extra-inning affair with Florida. That includes three straight weekend sweeps.

**OSPREYS, EAGLES AND FISH, OH MY**

During the eighth inning of Saturday afternoon's 5-2 win over Jacksonville State, play was momentarily halted due to a "fish delay". An osprey carrying a shell cracker fish in its talons flew over John Sessions Stadium. Suddenly, a bald eagle appeared and spooked the osprey into dropping the fish, which landed in right field. Play stopped long enough for JU's Connor Stephens to come off the bench to scoop up the fish in a towel and remove it from the field. The moment went viral, featured on websites such as Deadspin, SBNation, USA Today, Newsweek and more. The video was featured on the ESPN SportsCenter segment "Haven't Seen It...Should" and was played as part of Woody Paige's "Facetime" after winning Around the Horn on Tuesday.

**NEW FACES ON THE WEEKEND**

Junior RHP Tyler Santana is the only regular returner to the weekend rotation from last year, moving to Friday nights from Saturday's last year. For the second straight year, JU elevates the previous year's Saturday starter to Friday's, as Chris Gau replaced Michael Baumann in 2018. Joining Santana this year on the weekends is sophomore RHP Trent Palmer, a reliever in 27 appearances last year, and junior RHP AJ Jones, a junior college transfer.

**POSITION SWAP**

Senior Angel Camacho came to Jacksonville as a cornerinfielder, but appeared in every game of his career as a first baseman or designated hitter until a four game stretch last year at Florida and at Saint Louis where he filled in for an injured Sam Armstrong at third. Now Camacho takes over full-time at the hot corner for the departed Armstrong, a four-year starter at the position. In his place, senior John Cassala got the opening weekend nod at first, where he filled in for Camcho in that same four game stretch last year. Cassala has

played mostly outfield in his JU career since joining the team his sophomore year after one season at College of Central Florida, where he was a first baseman. Also, with the return of redshirt-junior SS Dakota Julylia after missing last year due to injury, junior Scott Dubrule moves back over to second base, where he earned ASUN All-Freshman Team honors two years ago.

**MAULONI EARNS PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN RECOGNITION**

Sophomore RHP Chris Mauloni finished tied for the national lead in saves last season, and his tremendous debut campaign is not going unnoticed. He became the first Dolphin since RHP Michael Baumann earned Preseason All-American honors back in 2016 to receive such prestigious recognition so early in the season. He was also part of the initial Stopper of the Year Watch List, presented annually to the top relief pitcher in college baseball by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association. Mauloni was a finalist for the award last year.

**BACK IN THE POSTSEASON**

Jacksonville returned to the NCAA postseason for the first time since 2011 last year. JU earned an at-large bid to the Gainesville Regional, receiving a two-seed, also the highest seed earned by the Dolphins in the Super Regional era. JU defeated Florida Atlantic 5-3 on the opening day of the regional for its first postseason win since 2011.

**HOME SWEET HOME**

JU won every home series it played at John Sessions Stadium last year, going 22-7 in the friendly confines last season, en route to its ninth best home winning percentage of all time, dating back to the beginning of the program in 1957. The 22 home wins were the most since 2006, and the seven losses matched the fewest for JU since 1983.

**40 WINS IN 2018**

Jacksonville won 40 games in the 2018 season, the first such season for the program since 2006.

**RANKED AGAIN**

JU reentered the national rankings last year for two weeks, reaching as high as #25 in the Baseball America Top-25 and #24 in the Rawlings/Perfect Game Top-25. JU was also climbed as high as #16 in the RPI rankings last season.

**DOWN GOES...**

Jacksonville picked up three more wins vs. ranked opponents last year, bringing the two year total to seven under Head Coach Chris Hayes, and 13 such victories in the last five seasons.

**HEARING THEIR NAMES ON DRAFT DAY**

For the 10th consecutive year, a Jacksonville Dolphin was selected in the annual Major League Baseball Draft. Junior RHP Chris Gau was selected in the 14th Round by the Tampa Bay Rays after starting on Friday nights for the Dolphins last spring and earning Second Team All-ASUN honors. Previous draft picks:

## HEAD COACH CHRIS HAYES

Chris Hayes enters his third year as the head coach of the Dolphins. Through his first two seasons at the helm of his alma mater, JU has won 76 games, returned to the NCAA postseason for the first time in seven years, won a regular season ASUN Conference Championship and brought the program back to being one of the top in the state of Florida.

Hayes led JU to a 40-win campaign for the first time since the 2006 season, earning a 2-seed in the Gainesville Regional and picking up an NCAA postseason win over FAU to start the regional. The Dolphins also earned a national ranking for the first time since 1997, reaching as high as #25 in the Baseball America Top-25 and #24 in the Perfect Game/Rawlings Top-25, as well as climbing as high as #16 in the RPI. Going 22-7 at John Sessions Stadium, JU posted its best home winning percentage since 1984. The Dolphins also picked up five regular season wins against eventual NCAA postseason participants, highlighted by an 8-4 win in Gainesville, Fla. over then #1 Florida on April 17.

Many players were recognized for their accomplishments throughout the season and after it. Freshman closer Chris Mauloni, who set a new single-season and career record for saves at JU while leading the nation and earning All-American distinctions from four different organizations. Eight players earned All-ASUN honors at the end of the season, three made the ASUN All-Tournament squad, Angel Camacho was named to the NCAA All-Regional Team and three different players earned ASUN Player of the Week honors four different times. Junior RHP Chris Gau was drafted in the 14th Round by the Tampa Bays Rays in the 2018 MLB Draft and signed a professional contract.

Hayes guided the Dolphins to a 36-24 record in 2017, leading the team to the ASUN Championship final. JU picked up wins against six NCAA Tournament participants, including a 3-2 home victory over eventual national champion Florida. The campaign also included a 13 game winning streak from April 1-22, the program's longest in 26 years.

In Hayes' first season the Dolphins had three players who recieved weekly ASUN honors during the season. Three players made ASUN All-Conference squads, while three more were honored on the All-Freshman Team, and four were named to the All-Tournament Team. Following the season, RHP Michael Baumann departed the team for the MLB June Amateur Draft, and was selected in the third round by the Baltimore Orioles. LHP Casey Kulina later signed with the Arizona Diamondbacks organization as an unsigned free agent.

Before taking the reigns of the program, Hayes spent three years as the Dolphins assistant head coach during his second stint with the team, which began in 2013.

As assistant head coach, Hayes served as the third base coach, coordinated the Dolphin offense, worked with the hitters, baserunners and infielders. He also coordinated and managed team travel, equipment and the strength and conditioning program. Additionally, Hayes spent significant time assisting Dolphin recruiting coordinator, Chuck Jeroloman, with recruiting.

Hayes' credentials as a result of working with the JU offense during his eight years as an assistant are impressive.

During his tenure, the Dolphins posted an eight-year batting average of .288, scored 5.95 runs per game and averaged 78 stolen bases per season and his work with the infield produced an average .964 fielding percentage.

A 1995 graduate of Jacksonville University, Hayes was previously on staff from 2003-08 before taking over the Seminole State College of Florida program as Head Coach for five seasons from 2009-2013. He brings to the JU program 15 years of coaching and nine years of playing experience at the collegiate and professional levels.

In 2013, Hayes returned to the River City after leading Seminole State to a 125-113-1 overall record in five seasons and represented the Mid-Florida Conference in the FCSAA state tournament in 2013. During his tenure, 51 student-athletes moved on to play at four-year universities and 13 were selected in MLB draft, including Cleveland Indians MLB pitcher, Mike Clevinger. Of the student-athletes Hayes mentored, 32 were named all-conference selections, eight earned all-state recognition including the 2013 Mid-Florida conference Pitcher of the Year, 2011 MFC Player of the Year, 2010 MFC Fireman of the Year and 2010 MFC Defensive Player of the Year.

Hayes first joined the Dolphins as an assistant coach in 2003, helping the team to back-to-back ASUN Conference championships and NCAA Regional appearances in 2006 and 2007. It marked the first consecutive regional appearances for the program since his final two years as a player with the Dolphins (1994-95). As recruiting coordinator, Hayes received national accolades with back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in Collegiate Baseball's Top 40 Poll.

Hayes was a four-year starter at Jacksonville from 1992-95, was drafted on two occasions by MLB organizations (1994, Seattle; 1995, Toronto) and twice earned All-Sun Belt Conference honors. He also picked up all-regional accolades as a junior. Hayes led the Dolphins to consecutive NCAA Regional appearances (1994, 1995) and ranks among the all-time Jacksonville leaders in RBI (176), at-bats (802), hits (271), doubles (53) and total bases (402).

A native of Jacksonville, Hayes earned his bachelor's degree from the University in finance in 1995 and his MBA in 2007.

Chris and his wife, Joy, live in Jacksonville.
