### QUICK HITTERS

Jacksonville is coming off of a series loss at Austin Peay this past weekend. It was the final non-conference series of the season for the Dolphins, who lost Friday and Sunday, while salvaging the series with a win on Saturday.

JU crushed three home runs on Saturday, the first time this season the Dolphins launched more than two in a game. Angel Camacho also left the yard for the 10th time, the first JU player since 2016 with double digit homeruns (Austin Hays, 16).

Jacksonville beat Bethune-Cookman 5-0 in a midweek contest last Tuesday, marking the first shutout for JU since a 15-0 win over Brown on March 9.

The win also marked the 100th of head coach Chris Hayes' career at his alma mater. He became the second fastest coach to the century mark in JU history.

Last time JU faced Florida State, the Dolphins earned its first win over the Seminoles since May 10, 2016. Jacksonville swept FSU that season. A sweep today would be the first three-game sweep over Florida State since 1982, when JU swept all four games with the Seminoles, two at home, two on the road.

Florida State is Jacksonville's second-most played opponent all-time, trailing only Stetson, whom the Dolphins face at home this weekend. The first matchup between the two teams took place on May 16, 1964, a doubleheader loss in Tallahassee.

Head Coach Mike Martin will coach his likely final two games against Jacksonville, the 121st and 122nd times he has skippered FSU against JU. His record is 90-25 all-time against JU.

The double-header today is the fifth of the season for Jacksonville. The Dolphins are 3-5 in DH games this year, sweeping Brown at home (the only scheduled DH of the year) and splitting with NJIT on the road, as well as dropping both games at UNCG and at FGCU. Weather has forced JU to play the three additional double-header's with today being no different, coming about due to rain outs in consecutive days back in February.

This is the penultimate midweek road trip for JU, who travel to South Florida next Tuesday.

This is the second time this season that Jacksonville has played at least five consecutive games on the road, following an earlier eight game road stretch which also included a trip to Tallahassee to conclude the month of March and begin play in April. JU went 5-3 on that long road stand, and are currently 1-2 entering the final two games of this road trip.

**SHADES OF THE OLD SCOTTY**

After hitting right around .240 for the first two months of the season, Scott Dubrule, who won the ASUN Conference regular season batting title last year and was a First Team All-ASUN selection his sophomore season and Preseason All-ASUN this year, has found his stride. He is now hitting a team-best .356 in 18 conference games and is hitting .306 (11-36) with three doubles and seven RBI over his last 10 games.

**ROUGH STRETCH**

JU was swept by FGCU two weekends ago in Fort Myers, managing to score only three runs in the series. It was the fewest runs scored in a three-game series since the Dolphins scored three at #19 TCU the opening weekend of the 2014 season. JU did salvage that series with a 2-0 win on Sunday. The Dolphins were swept in conference play for the first time since 2014, when Mercer took all three in Jacksonville from JU March 21-23.

**SPEED KILLS**

The 46 stolen bases for JU this year is a program single season high under third year head coach Chris Hayes, after swiping only 36 all of last year. After a very aggressive beginning to the season, the Dolphins have not run as frequently as of late, with just five steals in eight attempts over the last 10 games. Cory Heffron leads the team with 10 stolen bases.

**WELCOME BACK**

When redshirt-junior SS Dakota Julylia, a regular starter since game one of his freshman season, sat out all of last year with an injury, all he could think about was how much he missed the game. "I'll never take this game for granted again," he said following an early season victory this year. Since coming back to start all but three games so far this season for the Dolphins, he is on pace to break any prior career marks. He is sixth on the team with 20 RBI, matching his previous career-high and has already topped his career-best in steals with four. He had 10 extra base hits his sophomore season, and has nine this year, including his first career home run.

**CAMACHO STREAK(ED)**

Jacksonville's senior third baseman had his 33 game on-base streak come to a close on April 12 vs. North Alabama when he went 0-5. That is tied for the 23rd longest on-base streak in the country this season. It topped a previous career-best of 24 straight games on base set back in 2017.

**EXTRA, EXTRA!**

Jacksonville has already played in four extra inning games, going 2-2. The first three games took place in the midweek. The Dolphins went to extras three times all of last season, going 2-1 in such affairs.

**CLEAN SWEEPS**

JU picked up its third weekend sweep this season when the Dolphins took all three at home vs. Lipscomb to open up ASUN Conference play. The Dolphins completed six weekend sweeps last year, with exactly three occurring at home and three on the road.

**WEEKLY AWARD WINNERS**

Jacksonville has had two pitchers capture four weekly awards from the ASUN Conference this year. Freshman RHP Nick Love has been honored twice: the first week of March after earning his first collegiate win at UCF as part of a week in which he went 3.2 of scoreless relief with five strikeouts and last week after two scoreless appearances in which he went a combined 4.2 with six strikeouts. Junior RHP AJ Jones has also been recognized twice, first on March 25 after 8.2 innings of two hit, no earned run baseball in a win over Lipscomb, in which he also recorded 10 strikeouts. Most recently, he was recieved the award on this Monday after his 7 inning, one run, four strikeout, nine left on base performance helped JU to a win over Liberty and gave him his team-best sixth win of the season.

**OSPREYS, EAGLES AND FISH, OH MY**

During the eighth inning of Saturday afternoon's 5-2 win over Jacksonville State, play was momentarily halted due to a "fish delay". An osprey carrying a shell cracker fish in its talons flew over John Sessions Stadium. Suddenly, a bald eagle appeared and spooked the osprey into dropping the fish, which landed in right field. Play stopped long enough for JU's Connor Stephens to come off the bench to scoop up the fish in a towel and remove it from the field. The moment went viral, featured on websites such as Deadspin, SBNation, USA Today, Newsweek and more. The video was featured on the ESPN SportsCenter segment "Haven't Seen It...Should" and was played as part of Woody Paige's "Facetime" after winning Around the Horn on Tuesday.

**PRESEASON HONORS**

Jacksonville had four players named Preseason All-ASUN. Senior INF Angel Camacho, who was also voted Preseason Player of the Year, sophomore RHP Chris Mauloni, junior INF Scott Dubrulle and junior RHP Tyler Santana. Jacksonville was picked to finish second in the preseason ASUN Conference coaches poll.

**POSITION SWAP**

Senior Angel Camacho came to Jacksonville as a cornerinfielder, but appeared in every game of his career as a first baseman or designated hitter until a four game stretch last year at Florida and at Saint Louis where he filled in for an injured Sam Armstrong at third. Now Camacho takes over full-time at the hot corner for the departed Armstrong, a four-year starter at the position. In his place, senior John Cassala got the opening weekend nod at first, where he filled in for Camacho in that same four game stretch last year. Cassala has played mostly outfield in his JU career since joining the team his sophomore year after one season at College of Central Florida, where he was a first baseman. Also, with the return of redshirt-junior SS Dakota Julylia after missing last year due to injury, junior Scott Dubrulle moves back over to second base, where he earned ASUN All-Freshman Team honors two years ago.

**BACK IN THE POSTSEASON**

Jacksonville returned to the NCAA postseason for the first time since 2011 last year. JU earned an at-large bid to the Gainesville Regional, receiving a two-seed, also the highest seed earned by the Dolphins in the Super Regional era. JU defeated Florida Atlantic 5-3 on the opening day of the regional for its first postseason win since 2011.

**40 WINS IN 2018**

Jacksonville won 40 games in the 2018 season, the first such season for the program since 2006.

**RANKED AGAIN**

JU reentered the national rankings last year for two weeks, reaching as high as #25 in the Baseball America Top-25 and #24 in the Rawlings/Perfect Game Top-25. JU was also climbed as high as #16 in the RPI rankings last season.

**HEARING THEIR NAMES ON DRAFT DAY**

For the 10th consecutive year, a Jacksonville Dolphin was selected in the annual Major League Baseball Draft. Junior RHP Chris Gau was selected in the 14th Round by the Tampa Bay Rays after starting on Friday nights for the Dolphins last spring and earning Second Team All-ASUN honors. Previous draft picks:

**DOLPHINS IN THE PROS**

RHP Alex McRae made his major league debut last July for the Pittsburgh Pirates. He became the 10th former Dolphin to appear in a game for a major league ballclub. There are currently 10 former JU players active in the professional ranks. Daniel Murphy signed with Colorado in the offseason, and has assumed the starting first baseman role in the Mile High City.



## HEAD COACH CHRIS HAYES

Chris Hayes enters his third year as the head coach of the Dolphins. Through his first two seasons at the helm of his alma mater, JU has won 76 games, returned to the NCAA postseason for the first time in seven years, won a regular season ASUN Conference Championship and brought the program back to being one of the top in the state of Florida.

Hayes led JU to a 40-win campaign for the first time since the 2006 season, earning a 2-seed in the Gainesville Regional and picking up an NCAA postseason win over FAU to start the regional. The Dolphins also earned a national ranking for the first time since 1997, reaching as high as #25 in the Baseball America Top-25 and #24 in the Perfect Game/Rawlings Top-25, as well as climbing as high as #16 in the RPI. Going 22-7 at John Sessions Stadium, JU posted its best home winning percentage since 1984. The Dolphins also picked up five regular season wins against eventual NCAA postseason participants, highlighted by an 8-4 win in Gainesville, Fla. over then #1 Florida on April 17.

Many players were recognized for their accomplishments throughout the season and after it. Freshman closer Chris Mauloni, who set a new single-season and career record for saves at JU while leading the nation and earning All-American distinctions from four different organizations. Eight players earned All-ASUN honors at the end of the season, three made the ASUN All-Tournament squad, Angel Camacho was named to the NCAA All-Regional Team and three different players earned ASUN Player of the Week honors four different times. Junior RHP Chris Gau was drafted in the 14th Round by the Tampa Bays Rays in the 2018 MLB Draft and signed a professional contract.

Hayes guided the Dolphins to a 36-24 record in 2017, leading the team to the ASUN Championship final. JU picked up wins against six NCAA Tournament participants, including a 3-2 home victory over eventual national champion Florida. The campaign also included a 13 game winning streak from April 1-22, the program's longest in 26 years.

In Hayes' first season the Dolphins had three players who recieved weekly ASUN honors during the season. Three players made ASUN All-Conference squads, while three more were honored on the All-Freshman Team, and four were named to the All-Tournament Team. Following the season, RHP Michael Baumann departed the team for the MLB June Amateur Draft, and was selected in the third round by the Baltimore Orioles. LHP Casey Kulina later signed with the Arizona Diamondbacks organization as an unsigned free agent.

Before taking the reigns of the program, Hayes spent three years as the Dolphins assistant head coach during his second stint with the team, which began in 2013.

As assistant head coach, Hayes served as the third base coach, coordinated the Dolphin offense, worked with the hitters, baserunners and infielders. He also coordinated and managed team travel, equipment and the strength and conditioning program. Additionally, Hayes spent significant time assisting Dolphin recruiting coordinator, Chuck Jeroloman, with recruiting.

Hayes' credentials as a result of working with the JU offense during his eight years as an assistant are impressive.

During his tenure, the Dolphins posted an eight-year batting average of .288, scored 5.95 runs per game and averaged 78 stolen bases per season and his work with the infield produced an average .964 fielding percentage.

A 1995 graduate of Jacksonville University, Hayes was previously on staff from 2003-08 before taking over the Seminole State College of Florida program as Head Coach for five seasons from 2009-2013. He brings to the JU program 15 years of coaching and nine years of playing experience at the collegiate and professional levels.

In 2013, Hayes returned to the River City after leading Seminole State to a 125-113-1 overall record in five seasons and represented the Mid-Florida Conference in the FCSAA state tournament in 2013. During his tenure, 51 student-athletes moved on to play at four-year universities and 13 were selected in MLB draft, including Cleveland Indians MLB pitcher, Mike Clevinger. Of the student-athletes Hayes mentored, 32 were named all-conference selections, eight earned all-state recognition including the 2013 Mid-Florida conference Pitcher of the Year, 2011 MFC Player of the Year, 2010 MFC Fireman of the Year and 2010 MFC Defensive Player of the Year.

Hayes first joined the Dolphins as an assistant coach in 2003, helping the team to back-to-back ASUN Conference championships and NCAA Regional appearances in 2006 and 2007. It marked the first consecutive regional appearances for the program since his final two years as a player with the Dolphins (1994-95). As recruiting coordinator, Hayes received national accolades with back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in Collegiate Baseball's Top 40 Poll.

Hayes was a four-year starter at Jacksonville from 1992-95, was drafted on two occasions by MLB organizations (1994, Seattle; 1995, Toronto) and twice earned All-Sun Belt Conference honors. He also picked up all-regional accolades as a junior. Hayes led the Dolphins to consecutive NCAA Regional appearances (1994, 1995) and ranks among the all-time Jacksonville leaders in RBI (176), at-bats (802), hits (271), doubles (53) and total bases (402).

A native of Jacksonville, Hayes earned his bachelor's degree from the University in finance in 1995 and his MBA in 2007.

Chris and his wife, Joy, live in Jacksonville.
