QUICK HITTERS

Jacksonville travels to Tallahassee to make up for a rainout earlier this season. The Dolphins play a seven-inning DH against Florida State for the second time since 2019.

The Dolphins defeated the Seminoles at home earlier this season, prevailing 3-2 on Feb. 22. JU fell behind 2-0 early, but rallied behind a two-run fifth inning, fueled by Cam Ridley's RBI double and, later, a Ridley run scored on a wild pitch. Tommy Joseph drove in the winning run with an RBI single to rightfield in the sixth. The pitching was strong, with Michael Darrell-Hicks allowing just one run with eight strikeouts in three innings to start, including six-straight Ks to start the game. Blake Barquin threw 3.2 innings of scoreless relief to earn the win, allowing just one hit and striking out five. Tyler Vogel got the final two outs for his second save of the year.

JU has won two of the last three games played at Dick Howser Stadium, and have won three of the last four matchups overall against the Seminoles, after being swept in three matchups in 2018.

JU is coming off of a 2-3 week, with the Dolphins splitting the two midweeks (beating Bethune-Cookman and losing to FAMU) before traveling up to Lynchburg and taking one of three against Liberty.

RHP Heston Mosley draws the start on Tuesday night in game one. He is coming off of a career-long outing last week, going eight innings, allowing only two runs on one hit with nine strikeouts, one of a career-high, in earning a win against BCU.

Chase Malloy is the hottest hitter on the team, batting .472 (17-36) with an OPS of 1.139 over the last 10 games. He also has a team-best six steals over that stretch. He has also drawn eight walks and been hit by three pitches, as he continues to be an on-base force in the leadoff spot for the Dolphins.

HONORS AND AWARDS

Redshirt-junior RHP Mason Adams was named ASUN Pitcher of the Week and a National Player of the Week by Collegiate Baseball March 7. He earned the honor by earning a win against Butler the Friday prior, when he went a career-long eight innings, allowing only one run on four hits and tying the school single-game strikeouts record with 13.

RECORD SETTING GAME

Jacksonville set a new program record in game length on Sunday, March 13, going to 20 innings in Miami against FIU before ultimately winning, 9-4, on the strength of Jesus Pacheco's RBI single and Christian Coipel's grand slam.

It was the longest game in program history, topping the previous record of 19 innings, played back on April 15, 1967, ultimately a 4-3 win for the Dolphins over Oglethorpe, now a DIII institution in Atlanta.

EXPLOSION OF RUNS

JU did not waste any time getting the bats going this season. The Dolphins matched last season's high run total of 17, accomplished in a 17-1 win over FGCU in the decisive game three vs. FGCU in the ASUN Baseball Championship Quarterfinal series, in its Saturday victory over High Point.

The 17 runs scored was the seventh time in the last decade that the Dolphins have scored 17 or more in a game.

OUCH

Chase Malloy has plenty of bruises from his first season in a JU uniform. The junior shortstop and leadoff man has been hit by 16 pitches so far this season, which is tied for the most times a Dolphin has been plunked in a season with Zach Osbeck in 1996. In part due to his ability to wear pitches, he leads the team in on-base percentage at .425. After not being plunked since April 2 against Liberty, he was hit twice on April 23 at Kennesaw State.

LOCK DOWN LATE

Tyler Vogel has excelled in the backhalf of the bullpen, registering a four wins in relief and eight saves already this season, which is tied for seventh-most in a single season in JU history. He registered his first save on April 23 since March 25 at FGCU.

YABO

Christian Coipel has led the program in homers the last two seasons and has left the yard 12 times this season, the most homers in a season for a Dolphin since Austin Hays hit 16 in 2016 and also a new career-high. He had a streak of four-straight games with a homer snapped on at FIU on March 13. Additionally, he is driving runs often, with 43 total, also a new career-high and t-11th in the ASUN.

SPEED

This Jacksonville team has been the most aggressive on the basepaths in the Chris Hayes era, spanning six seasons. The Dolphins have swiped 78 bases after only taking 36 last year and the most since 2016, when JU collected 75 steals. The last year JU hit the century steal mark was 2012 (104). Three Dolphins are in double-figure steals, with Chase Malloy (19), Blake DeLamielleure (18) and Cam Ridley (11) pacing the Dolphins. Cory Heffron had 16 steals in 2019.

YOU'RE GOING TO NEED A PROGRAM

Jacksonville added 21 newcomers to the roster this year, with Head Coach Chris Hayes taking advantage of the NCAA's current roster flexibility rules to carry a deeper roster than normal. Of the newcomers, two are graduate transfers, four are juniors, three are sophomores and 12 are freshman. By position, eight are position players and 13 are pitchers.

DEPTH AN ASSET

JU has used multiple new players this year, both in the lineup and on the mound. Ten new pitchers have made their Dolphin debuts, two as starters and the rest out of the bullpen. Nine new position players have started at least one game so far this season.

DOWN GOES...

Jacksonville defeated #10 Florida State on Feb. 22 for yet another win over a ranked team. JU beat #5 Florida and #17 Florida State last season to claim even more success against ranked opponents. The five-plus year total under Head Coach Chris Hayes is 12, and 18 such victories in the last decade.

AMBIDEXTROUS ELI

Redshirt-sophomore Elias Flowers has always found a way to be a sparkplug for JU, and lately, he has been leaning on his multi-faceted baseball background. Traditionally a lefthanded hitting, lefthanded throwing outfielder, the Montgomery, Illinois has switched to playing the field righthanded. He credits his father, who taught him to throw and catch with both hands at a young age for his ambidextrous nature. In high school, he played second base (righthanded) and also was a switch-hitter until committing to hitting lefthanded in high school.

LEPI

Redshirt-senior firstbaseman Christian Coipel carries a unique talent with him: he has the ability to repeat any word you say back to you backwards without hesitation. This fun trick earned Coipel his nickname: his last name backwards is Lepioc, or, for short, Lepi.

TIGHT FADES

Ask people who move to a new town what the hardest thing to find is and they won't say a good restaurant or store. It is always "where can I find a good barber?". Luckily for JU, the best barber is on the team. Elias Flowers not only plays a mean outfield and swipes bases on the reg, but also keeps his teammates clean with haircuts on a weekly basis for whomever needs them.

IMPROBABLE RUN

Jacksonville captured its eighth conference championship in program history last season, with none being more improbable. The Dolphins entered the month of May with a 7-28 overall record and not a single conference victory. The team then captured its first ASUN series win at Stetson, won four of its final seven games, beat #1 seed FGCU in the ASUN Baseball Championship First Round series in Fort Myers, and then won three-straight in Jacksonville to capture the tournament title and the automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament. It was the school's first conference championship since 2017, and first tournament title since 2009.

EXTRA, EXTRA!

Jacksonville has played three extra-innings games this season, at FIU (20) at FAMU (12) and this past Sunday vs. FGCU (10). JU played three extra inning games last year, going 1-2, with two of the games going to 11 innings and one being settled in 10. JU went to seven (!) extra inning games in 2019, and added another in the shortened 2020 season, falling to Florida 4-3 in 10 innings. After an astounding eight games that went to extras in 2017, the Dolphins have played free baseball 24 times in Head Coach Chris Hayes' five-plus years at the helm. JU has a 15-9 mark in such contests.

WELCOMING THREE NEW SCHOOLS

The ASUN Conference officially welcomed three new schools into the league starting in the fall of 2021. Jacksonville State, Eastern Kentucky and Central Arkansas brought the league membership 12 total schools. Jacksonville State and Eastern Kentucky left the Ohio Valley Conference, while Central Arkansas vacates the Southland Conference. The Dolphins are most familiar with JSU, playing the Gamecocks 22 times over the years, and holding a 20-2 all-time mark against them, including a perfect 6-0 mark in their most recent series, in 2018 and 2019. JU is 3-1 all-time against EKV and has never faced Central Arkansas before. Next year, the league adds Austin Peay to its ranks, but prepares for the departure of Liberty and Jacksonville State to the Conference USA.

DOLPHINS IN THE PROS

RHP Michael Baumann made his major league debut in August of 2021 for the Baltimore Orioles. He became the 11th former Dolphin to appear in a game for a major league ballclub, and joined his former JU teammate, OF Austin Hays, in the bigs in Baltimore. Other recent Dolphins to make their big league debuts are RHP Alex McRae who first appeared in July 2019 for the Pittsburgh Pirates and the aforementioned Hays, who was the first member of the 2016 MLB Draft to make the majors.



HEAD COACH CHRIS HAYES

Chris Hayes enters his sixth year as the head coach of the Dolphins. Through his first five seasons at the helm of his alma mater, JU has won 133 games, returned to the NCAA postseason for the first time in seven years, won a regular season and tournament ASUN Conference Championship and brought the program back to being one of the top in the state of Florida.

Jacksonville turned around its 2021 season in one of the most improbable runs to the postseason ever. JU won four of its last seven regular season games, eliminated FGCU in a three-game series in Fort Myers and went 3-0 the rest of the ASUN Baseball Championship, with a win over North Florida and two over Liberty to earn the program's eighth conference championship and 16th NCAA Regional berth. JU was led by strong play from its veterans late, with RHP Tyler Santana winning tournament MVP and four other Dolphins joining him on the All-Tournament Team. A few young players excelled as well, with infielders Jackson Grabsky and Jesus Pacheco earning All-Freshman Team honors.

The Dolphins' season was cut short in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but the starting pitching excelled for the entirety of the season, headlined by junior right-handers Trent Palmer and Austin Temple, who went on to win a combined three ASUN Pitcher of the Week awards. The staff's 188 strikeouts and 10.60 K/9 were both tops in the ASUN Conference. Palmer led the league in strikeouts and finished 13th nationally with a 0.61 WHIP. Temple finished with a league-leading 0.71 ERA. On the offensive side, Scott Dubrule collected the sixth-most hits in the country on the season, and Christian Coipel showed signs of record-setting power, slugging five home runs in just 17 games played.

Jacksonville tested itself early and often in the 2019 season, hosting three straight eventual NCAA Tournament teams to begin the year. Highlights from the season include winning the season series vs. Florida State, an eventually College World Series participant, for the first time since 2016, and winning conference series over Liberty, NJIT, Lipscomb and Stetson. The ASUN Conference Championship also featured two extra innings victory to open up the tournament. For the first time in school history, a Dolphin earned ASUN Conference Defensive Player of the Year when redshirt-junior shortstop Dakota Julylia was honored. He was one of two First Team All-ASUN selections along with third baseman Angel Camacho. Four other JU players earned all-conference honors, while two took home All-Academic awards. Three players were selected in the MLB Draft, led by Camacho, who went in the eighth round to Toronto, and followed by RHP Zach Bryant in the 15th round by the Chicago Cubs and RHP Chris Mauloni to Boston in the 35th round.

In 2018, Hayes led JU to a 40-win campaign for the first time since the 2006 season, earning a 2-seed in the Gainesville Regional and picking up an NCAA postseason win over FAU to start the regional. The Dolphins also earned a national ranking for the first time since 1997, reaching as high as #25 in the Baseball America Top-25 and #24 in the Perfect Game/Rawlings Top-25, as well as climbing as high as #16 in the RPI. Going 22-7 at John Sessions Stadium, JU posted its best home winning percentage since 1984. The Dolphins also picked up five regular season wins against eventual NCAA postseason participants, highlighted by an 8-4 win in Gainesville, Fla. over then #1 Florida on April 17.

Many players were recognized for their accomplishments throughout the season and after it. Freshman closer Chris Mauloni, who set a new single-season and career record for saves at JU while leading the nation and earning All-American distinctions from four different organizations. Eight players earned All-ASUN honors at the end of the season, three made the ASUN All-Tournament squad, Angel Camacho was named to the NCAA All-Regional Team and three different players earned ASUN Player of the Week honors four different times. Junior RHP Chris Gau was drafted in the 14th Round by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 2018 MLB Draft and signed a professional contract.

Hayes guided the Dolphins to a 36-24 record in 2017, leading the team to the ASUN Championship final. JU picked up wins against six NCAA Tournament participants, including a 3-2 home victory over eventual national champion Florida. The campaign also included a 13-game winning streak from April 1-22, the program's longest in 26 years.

In Hayes' first season the Dolphins had three players who received weekly ASUN honors during the season. Three players made ASUN All-Conference squads, while three more were honored on the All-Freshman Team, and four were named to the All-Tournament Team. Following the season, RHP Michael Baumann departed the team for the MLB June Amateur Draft, and was selected in the third round by the Baltimore Orioles. LHP Casey Kulina later signed with the Arizona Diamondbacks organization as an unsigned free agent.

Before taking the reins of the program, Hayes spent three years as the Dolphins assistant head coach during his second stint with the team, which began in 2013.

As assistant head coach, Hayes served as the third base coach, coordinated the Dolphin offense, worked with the hitters, baserunners and infielders. He also coordinated and managed team travel, equipment and the strength and conditioning program. Additionally, Hayes spent significant time assisting Dolphin recruiting coordinator, Chuck Jeroloman, with recruiting.

During his time as an assistant, Hayes mentored four All-Americans, two freshman All-Americans, 19 Atlantic Sun Conference selections, 12 ASUN All-Freshman team selections, three ASUN Player/Pitcher of the Year award winners. Nineteen Dolphins signed Major League Baseball contracts, including Austin Hays, JJ Gould, Connor Marabell, and Angelo Amendolare.

A 1995 graduate of Jacksonville University, Hayes was previously on staff from 2003-08 before taking over the Seminole State College of Florida program as Head Coach for five seasons from 2009-2013. He brings to the JU program 15 years of coaching and nine years of playing experience at the collegiate and professional levels.

In 2013, Hayes returned to the River City after leading Seminole State to a 125-113-1 overall record in five seasons and represented the Mid-Florida Conference in the FCSAA state tournament in 2013. During his tenure, 51 student-athletes moved on to play at four-year universities and 13 were selected in MLB draft, including Cleveland Indians MLB pitcher, Mike Clevinger.

Hayes first joined the Dolphins as an assistant coach in 2003, helping the team to back-to-back ASUN Conference championships and NCAA Regional appearances in 2006 and 2007. It marked the first consecutive regional appearances for the program since his final two years as a player with the Dolphins (1994-95). As recruiting coordinator, Hayes received national accolades with back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in Collegiate Baseball's Top 40 Poll.

Prior to his time at JU, Hayes spent two years as an assistant coach at Wolfson High School in Jacksonville from 2002-03, where the team won the district championship in 2002 and 2003, while earning a No. 12 national ranking at the end of the 2003 season. Two of his coaching prospects are former first-round selections and MLB players - Eric Hurley and Billy Butler.

Before launching his coaching career, Hayes spent five seasons (1995-2000) with the Toronto Blue Jays organization after being drafted in the 28th round of the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. He played every infield and outfield position in five seasons with the Blue Jays' minor league system finishing with a .276 career batting average. Over the course of his career, Hayes made stops in St. Catherine's, Ontario; Hagerstown, Md.; Dunedin, Fla.; and Knoxville, Tenn. while in the minors.

Hayes was a four-year starter at Jacksonville from 1992-95, was drafted on two occasions by MLB organizations (1994, Seattle; 1995, Toronto) and twice earned All-Sun Belt Conference honors. He also picked up all-regional accolades as a junior. Hayes led the Dolphins to consecutive NCAA Regional appearances (1994, 1995) and ranks among the all-time Jacksonville leaders in RBI (176), at-bats (802), hits (271), doubles (53) and total bases (402).

A native of Jacksonville, Hayes earned his bachelor's degree from the University in finance in 1995 and his MBA in 2007. Chris and his wife, Joy, live in Jacksonville.
